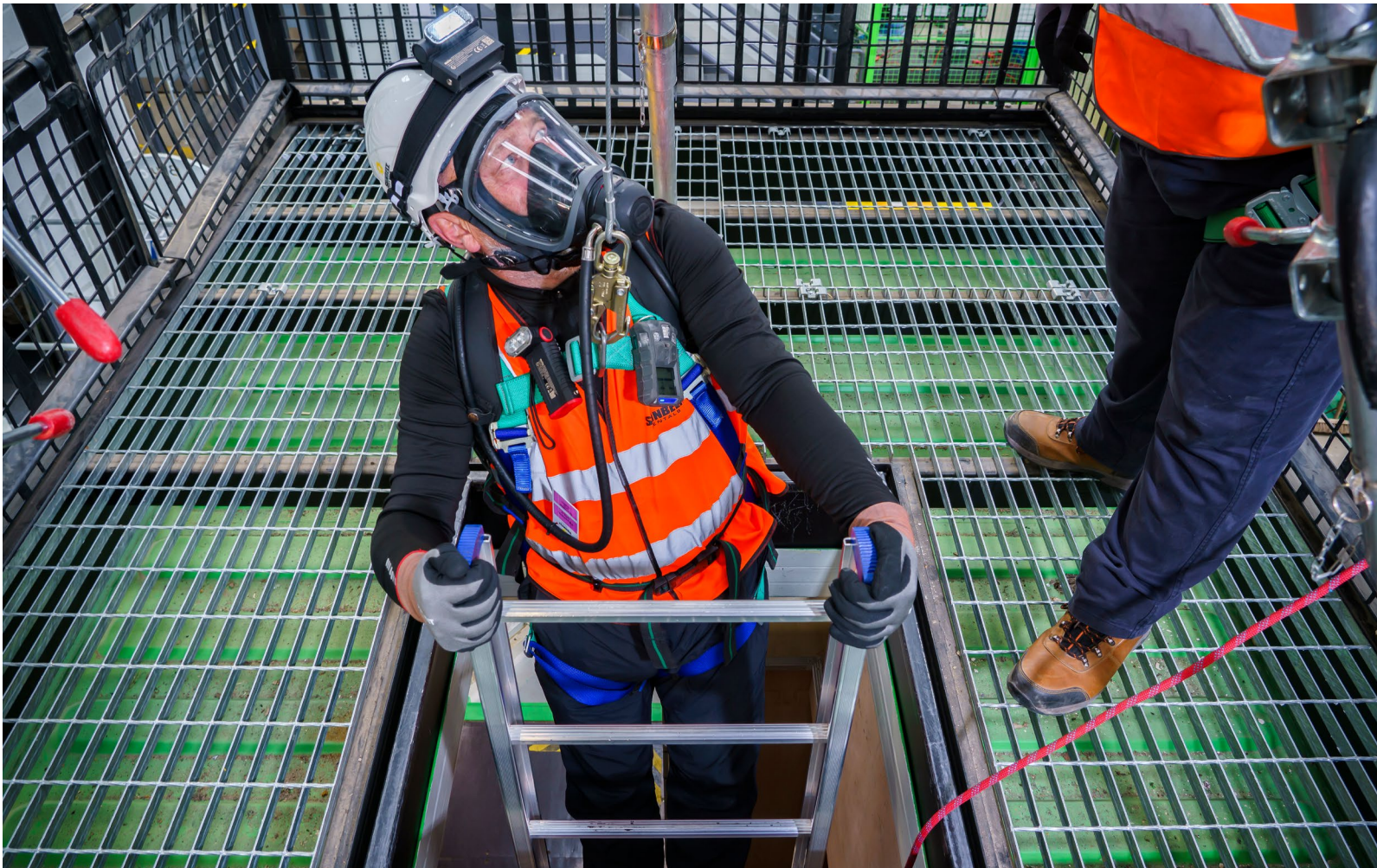
Which City & Guilds course is right for me?

Confined Spaces training courses listed below are suitable for entry-level learners with no proof of prior learning or previous qualifications required (unless otherwise stated).

Course	Requirements	Duration	Examples
Level 2 Award in Working in Low Risk Confined Spaces (6160-01)	This course is for you if: ■ Access is simple and unobstructed with no likely risk of flooding and may include lone working. ■ There is adequate natural or mechanical ventilation and does not require escape breathing apparatus.	1 day	Meter pit, valve chamber, PRV chamber, cellar
Level 2 Award in Entrant and Entry Controller for Confined Spaces (Medium Risk) (6160-09)	This course is for you if: ■ Escape breathing apparatus is required due to the risk of encountering a hazardous atmosphere. ■ Access is vertical direct unobstructed and may require attachment to a rescue device or team entry. ■ You may also be required to control medium risk entry & emergency procedures (Entry Controller).	2 days	Man entry sewers, utility service, subway tunnels, complex wet wells
Level 2 Award in Working in High Risk Confined Spaces (6160-03)	This course is for you if: ■ A known hazardous atmosphere requires the use of self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA). ■ Entry is complex and requires emergency rescue arrangements to be in place (rescue team).	3 days	Intrinsic or introduced – hazardous atmosphere, physical restrictions
Level 3 Award in Control Entry and Arrangements for Confined Spaces (High Risk) (6160-04)	This course is for you if: ■ You are required to control entry and arrangements for high risk confined spaces without entering them (Entry Controller). ■ Entry Controller duties include pre-entry procedures, controlling confined space entry and exit, initiating, and controlling emergency procedures.	3 days	
Level 3 Award in Supervising Teams Undertaking Work in Confined Spaces (6160-05)	This course is for you if: ■ You are responsible for pre-entry procedures, entry into and exit from the confined space, selection of personnel, maintaining communications and initiating controlling emergency procedures.	2 days	
Level 4 Award in Plan, Manage and Review Legislative and Safety Compliance for Work in Confined Spaces (6160-06)	This course is for you if: ■ You are a manager responsible for organising, planning and managing work in confined spaces.	4 day course plus additional coursework	

Level 3 Award in Directing Emergency Rescue and Recovery of Casualties from Confined Spaces (6160-07)	This course is for you if: ■ You direct the activities of a team for rescue or recovery in confined spaces, including planning and preparing for emergency operations, mobilising rescue teams, securing sites after incidents or emergencies.	1 day	
Level 3 Award in Working as a Member of a Rescue and Recovery Team in Confined Spaces (6160-08)	This course is for you if: ■ You are required to carry out emergency activities in confined spaces. ■ You are responsible for rescue arrangements and casualty recovery as a member of a rescue and recovery team.	3 days	Emergency rescue and casualty recovery
This course requires proof of prior learning or previous qualifications prior to attendance. Delegates must hold City & Guilds Level 2 Award in Working in High Risk Confined Spaces qualification (6160-03) or equivalent and Emergency First Aid at Work (in line with Health & Safety (First Aid) Regulations) prior to attendance.			
Levels 2 & 3 Awards in High Risk Confined Spaces (6160-03) and in Working as a Member of a Rescue and Recovery Team in Confined Spaces (6160-08)	This course is for you if: ■ You are required to work in a high risk environment, and as part of a rescue and recovery team in confined spaces.	5 days	
Levels 2 & 3 Awards in High Risk Confined Spaces (6160-03) and in Control Entry and Arrangements for Confined Spaces (6160-04)	This course is for you if: ■ You are required to work in a high risk environment, as well as an entry controller/top person.	4 days	

Note: City & Guilds 6160-01, 6160-02, 6160-09, 6160-03, and 6160-04 qualifications are suitable for entry-level delegates and require no proof of prior learning or previous qualifications.



Working in Low Risk Confined Spaces (6160-01)



Aims & Objectives

This City & Guilds course reflects the national occupational standard for a low risk related confined space and covers water and non-water industry areas.

Water: this may include working with potable water, sewage treatment processes, drain and sewer cleaning operations or where the operative is working in or near water or where a confined space is subject to surface water flooding

Non-water: this may include pharmaceutical, petrochemical, asbestos removal, vehicle manufacture and servicing, aeronautical, construction, communications, power, utilities, gas, electrical and mechanical engineering and some elements of work operations in mines, quarries and tunnelling.

This City and Guild's course is endorsed by Energy and Utility Skills.

- Safely entering and exiting low risk confined spaces
- Equipment and tools including pre and after-use checks including gas detectors
- Safe system of work
- Dealing with emergencies
- Understanding the principles of working in low risk confined spaces

- Assessments – both practical and written

Delegate Information

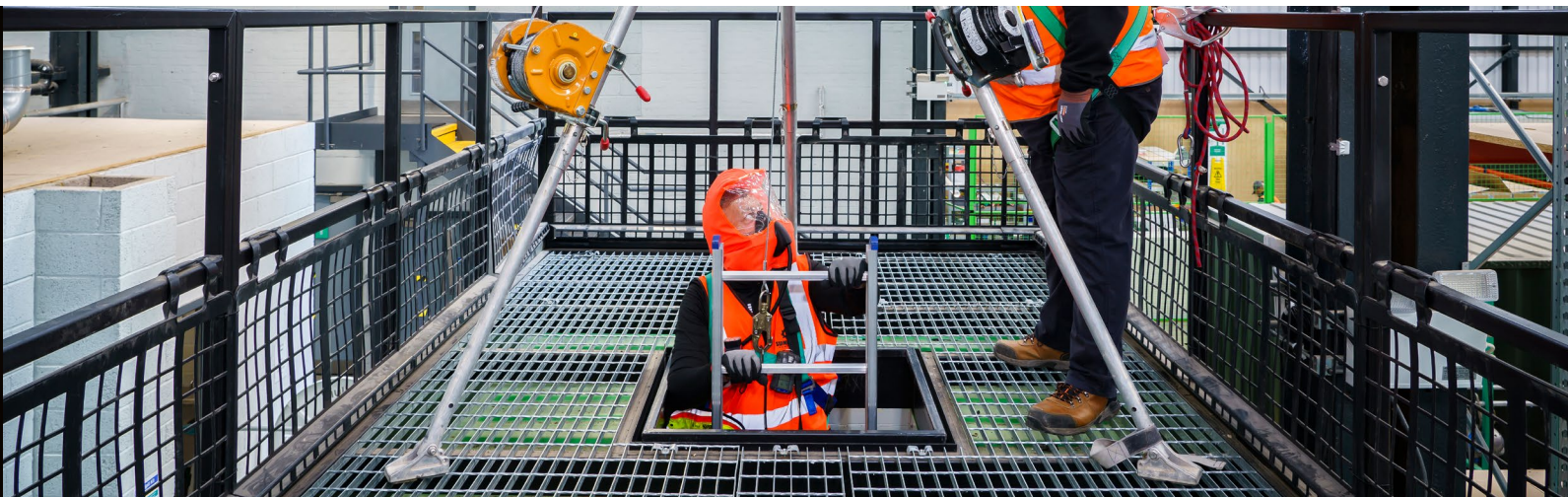
This one day course is for anyone working in a low risk environment and includes preparing to enter and work safely, entering and exiting confined spaces safely, using equipment and tools, following procedures and dealing with emergencies.

Delegates participating in this course must be medically fit enter into a confined space.

Certification

Following successful completion of the course, delegate's results will be audited by a City & Guilds quality assurance process. On completion, a Level 2 Award in Working in Low Risk Confined Spaces (6160-01) certificate will be issued (Please note the quality assurance process may take up to 12 weeks).

Entrant and Entry Controller for Confined Spaces (MEDIUM RISK) (6160-09)



Aims & Objectives

This City & Guilds course reflects the national occupational standard for controlling entry and arrangements while working in a medium risk confined space environment and covers water and non-water industry areas.

Water: this may include working with potable water, sewage treatment processes, drain and sewer cleaning operations or where the operative is working in or near water or where a confined space is subject to surface water flooding

Non-water: this may include pharmaceutical, petrochemical, asbestos removal, vehicle manufacture and servicing, aeronautical, construction, communications, power, utilities, gas, electrical and mechanical engineering and some elements of work operations in mines, quarries and tunnelling.

This City and Guild's course is endorsed by Energy and Utility Skills.

- Preparing to work safely in medium risk confined spaces
- Safely entering and exiting medium risk confined spaces
- Work safely and monitor the work team to ensure procedures are followed
- Dealing with emergencies
- Understanding the principles of working in medium risk confined spaces
- Understanding standard protocols for working in medium risk confined spaces
- Understanding entry controller duties and responsibilities
- Equipment checks and inspection including gas detectors and escape sets
- Assessments – both practical and written

Delegate Information

This two day course is suitable for delegates who work or are preparing to work in a medium risk environment, including those working as an entry controller/top person who controls the entry and arrangements for medium-risk confined spaces. It includes the duties of an entry controller, pre-entry procedures, preparing to work safely, using equipment and tools safely, entry into and exit from the medium risk confined space, maintaining communications, and initiating and following emergency arrangements.

Delegates participating in this course must be medically fit to wear breathing apparatus and to enter into a confined space.

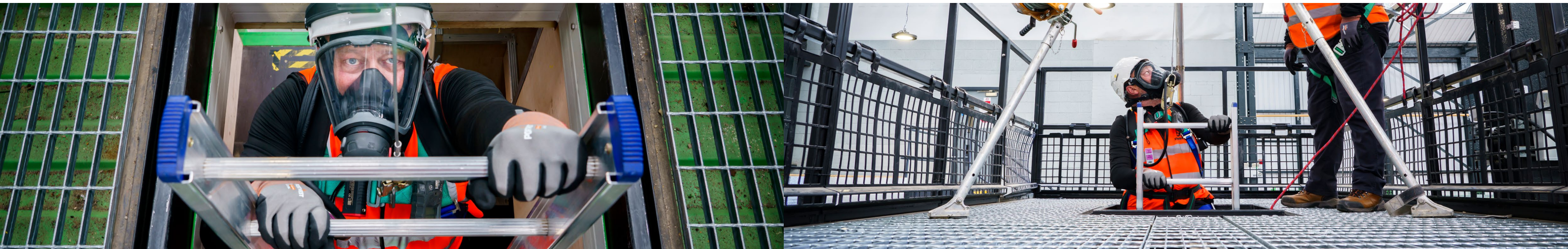
All courses will be delivered using the Hooded Style Escape Set (CF10/Cf15). If you require training on a "Mask Style Escape Set (PP10/PP15) then you will be required to be clean shaven and notify the training team to provide you with a set.

Certification

Following successful completion of the course, delegate's results will be audited by a City & Guilds quality assurance process. On completion, a Level 2 Award in Entrant and Entry Controller for Confined Spaces (Medium Risk) (6160-09) certificate will be issued (Please note the quality assurance process may take up to 12 weeks).

CITY & GUILDS LEVEL 2 AWARD

Working in High Risk Confined Spaces (6160-03)



Aims & Objectives

This City & Guilds course reflects the national occupational standard for a high risk related confined space and covers water and non-water industry areas.

Water: this may include working with potable water, sewage treatment processes, drain and sewer cleaning operations or where the operative is working in or near water or where a confined space is subject to surface water flooding

Non-water: this may include pharmaceutical, petrochemical, asbestos removal, vehicle manufacture and servicing, aeronautical, construction, communications, power, utilities, gas, electrical and mechanical engineering and some elements of work operations in mines, quarries and tunnelling.

This City and Guild's course is endorsed by Energy and Utility Skills.

On completion, a Level 2 Award in Working in High Risk Confined Spaces (6160-03) certificate will be issued (Please note the quality assurance process may take up to 12 weeks).

CITY & GUILDS LEVEL 3 AWARD

Control Entry and Arrangements for Confined Spaces (6160-04)

Aims & Objectives

This City & Guilds course reflects the national occupational standard for controlling entry and arrangements at a confined space and covers water and non-water industry areas.

Water: this may include working with potable water, sewage treatment processes, drain and sewer cleaning operations or where the operative is working in or near water or where a confined space is subject to surface water flooding

Non-water: this may include pharmaceutical, petrochemical, asbestos removal, vehicle manufacture and servicing, aeronautical, construction, communications, power, utilities, gas, electrical and mechanical engineering and some elements of work operations in mines, quarries and tunnelling.

This City and Guild's course is endorsed by Energy and Utility Skills.

CITY & GUILDS LEVEL 3 AWARD

Supervising Teams Undertaking Work in Confined Spaces (6160-05)

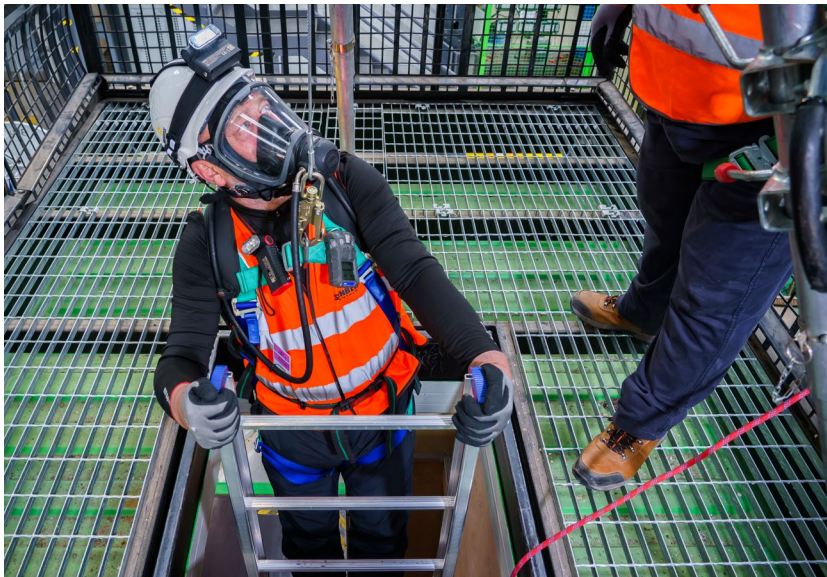
Aims & Objectives

This City & Guilds course reflects the national occupational standard for supervising entry and arrangements at a confined space and covers water and non-water industry areas.

Water: this may include working with potable water, sewage treatment processes, drain and sewer cleaning operations or where the operative is working in or near water or where a confined space is subject to surface water flooding

Non-water: this may include pharmaceutical, petrochemical, asbestos removal, vehicle manufacture and servicing, aeronautical, construction, communications, power, utilities, gas, electrical and mechanical engineering and some elements of work operations in mines, quarries and tunnelling.

This City and Guild's course is endorsed by Energy and Utility Skills.



Agenda

- Implementing procedures for teams working in confined spaces
- Supervising the control of safe entry and exit to the confined space
- Supervising the work team to ensure procedures are followed
- Controlling emergency situations
- Understanding supervisory duties and responsibilities
- Understanding health and safety and environmental legislation
- Understanding standard protocols for working in confined spaces
- Understanding equipment checks and testing required
- Assessments – both practical and written

Delegate Information

This two day course is suitable for supervisors who plan or are preparing to plan and allocate activities for a team, pre-entry procedures, entry into and exit from the confined space, selection of personnel, maintaining communications and initiating and controlling emergency procedures.

If supervising teams in medium or low risk confined spaces, learners must hold the City & Guilds Level 2 Award in Working in Medium Risk Confined Spaces (6160-02) or City & Guilds Level 2 Award in Entrant and Entry Controller for Confined Spaces (Medium Risk) (6160-09) or an equivalent qualification*. If supervising teams in high risk confined spaces, learners must hold the City & Guilds Level 2 Award in Working in High Risk Confined Spaces Qualification (6160-03) or an equivalent qualification*.

* Equivalent qualifications must cover the same content as the current National Occupational Standards and be confirmed by the City and Guilds Quality Team.

Certification

Following successful completion of the course, delegate's results will be audited by a City & Guilds quality assurance process. On completion, a Level 3 Award in Supervising Teams Undertaking Work in Confined Spaces (6160-05) certificate will be issued (Please note the quality assurance process may take up to 12 weeks).

CITY & GUILDS LEVEL 4 AWARD

Plan, Manage and Review Legislative and Safety Compliance for Work in Confined Spaces (6160-06)

Aims & Objectives

This City & Guilds course reflects the national occupational standard for planning, managing and reviewing legislative and safety compliance for work in confined spaces and covers water and non-water industry areas.

Water: this may include working with potable water, sewage treatment processes, drain and sewer cleaning operations or where the operative is working in or near water or where a confined space is subject to surface water flooding

Non-water: this may include pharmaceutical, petrochemical, asbestos removal, vehicle manufacture and servicing, aeronautical, construction, communications, power, utilities, gas, electrical and mechanical engineering and some elements of work operations in mines, quarries and tunnelling.

This City and Guild's course is endorsed by Energy and Utility Skills.

Agenda

- Planning the management of work in confined spaces
- Managing confined space teams
- Recording and reviewing legislation relating to confined spaces
- Developing, monitoring and confirming procedures for working in confined spaces
- Understanding environmental, legislative and health and safety compliance
- Understanding organisational requirements for confined space working
- Understanding plant, tools and equipment for working in confined spaces
- Understanding emergency arrangements and rescue plans
- Assessments – both written and a portfolio of evidence

Delegate Information

This four day course (additional portfolio work is also required) is for managers who are responsible for organising planning and managing work in confined spaces. The manager may or may not supervise the actual job. It involves managing the work of others in, or at confined spaces; reviewing legal requirements; ensuring safety compliance; preparing procedures and appropriate documentation; and making suitable arrangements for dealing with emergencies.

Delegates must have suitable knowledge and experience and have completed one of the following qualifications prior to commencing the course:

- NEBOSH National General Certificate in Occupational Health and Safety
- NEBOSH International General Certificate in Occupational Health and Safety
- City & Guilds Level 6 Occupational Health and Safety
- NCRQ Level 6 Certificate in Applied Health and Safety
- NVQ Level 5 or Level 6 in Occupational Health and Safety Practice

Delegates must ensure they have achieved a required qualification before they enrol on the course and should provide evidence at the point of booking. Evidence can only be accepted in the form of certified copies of certificates.

Delegates must also bring with them a laptop for use on the course with MS Word installed.

Certification

Following successful completion of the course, delegate's results will be audited by a City & Guilds quality assurance process. On completion, a Level 4 Award in Plan, Manage and Review Legislative and Safety Compliance for Work in Confined Spaces (6160-06) certificate will be issued (Please note the quality assurance process may take up to 12 weeks).

Directing Emergency Rescue and Recovery of Casualties from Confined Spaces (6160-07)



Aims & Objectives

This City & Guilds course aims to reflect the national occupational standard for directing emergency rescue and recovery of casualties from confined spaces and covers water and non-water industry areas.

Water: this may include working with potable water, sewage treatment processes, drain and sewer cleaning operations or where the operative is working in or near water or where a confined space is subject to surface water flooding

Non-water: this may include pharmaceutical, petrochemical, asbestos removal, vehicle manufacture and servicing, aeronautical, construction, communications, power, utilities, gas, electrical and mechanical engineering and some elements of work operations in mines, quarries and tunnelling.

This City and Guild's course is endorsed by Energy and Utility Skills.

Agenda

- Planning and preparing emergency operations for a rescue team
- Mobilising a rescue team and direct entry and exit to the confined space
- Monitoring a rescue team to ensure procedures are followed
- Understanding the principles of working as rescue team leader
- Understanding rescue team leader duties and responsibilities
- Assessments – both practical and written

Delegate Information

This one day course is suitable for anyone who directs or are preparing to direct the activities of a team for rescue or recovery in confined spaces. This may include the rescue team leader, coordinator, entry controller/top person or supervisor in relation to rescue and recovery of casualties, planning and preparing for emergency operations, mobilising rescue teams, directing and monitoring rescue activities, reporting and securing sites after incidents or emergencies.

If supervising teams performing rescue and recovery, learners must also hold the City & Guilds Level 3 Award in Working as a Member of a Rescue and Recovery Team in Confined Spaces qualification (6160-08) or an equivalent qualification*.

* Equivalent qualifications must cover the same content as the current National Occupational Standards and be confirmed by the City and Guilds Quality Team.

Certification

Following successful completion of the course, delegate's results will be audited by a City & Guilds quality assurance process. On completion, a Level 3 Award in Direct Emergency Rescue and recovery of Casualties from Confined Spaces (6160-07) certificate will be issued (Please note the quality assurance process may take up to 12 weeks).

Working as a Member of a Rescue and Recovery Team in Confined Spaces (6160-08)

Aims & Objectives

This City & Guilds course reflects the national occupational standard for working as a rescue and recovery team member in confined spaces and covers water and non-water industry areas.

Water: this may include working with potable water, sewage treatment processes, drain and sewer cleaning operations or where the operative is working in or near water or where a confined space is subject to surface water flooding

Non-water: this may include pharmaceutical, petrochemical, asbestos removal, vehicle manufacture and servicing, aeronautical, construction, communications, power, utilities, gas, electrical and mechanical engineering and some elements of work operations in mines, quarries and tunnelling.

This City and Guild's course is endorsed by Energy and Utility Skills.

Delegate Information

This three day course is suitable for anyone who works or is preparing to work as part of a rescue and recovery team in confined spaces. It includes preparing to carry out emergency activities, entering and exiting confined spaces safely, using emergency equipment, conducting casualty recovery and handling devices as per manufacturers' specifications, rescuing and recovering casualties, following procedures and working safely.

If working as a rescue and recovery team member, learners must also hold the City & Guilds Level 2 Award in Working in High Risk Confined Spaces qualification (6160-03) or an equivalent qualification*.

Delegates participating in this course must be clean shaven, medically fit to wear breathing apparatus and to enter into a confined space. Delegates who arrive with facial hair will not be accepted onto the course.

* Equivalent qualifications must cover the same content as the current National Occupational Standards and be confirmed by the City and Guilds Quality Team.

Certification

Following successful completion of the course, delegate's results will be audited by a City & Guilds quality assurance process. CITY & GUILDS LEVEL 2 & 3 AWARD

High Risk Confined Spaces (6160-03) and Working as a Member of a Rescue and Recovery Team in Confined Spaces (6160-08)

Non-water: this may include pharmaceutical, petrochemical, asbestos removal, vehicle manufacture and servicing, aeronautical, construction, communications, power, utilities, gas, electrical and mechanical engineering and some elements of work operations in mines, quarries and tunnelling.

All courses will be delivered using the Hooded Style Escape Set (CF10/Cf15). If you require training on a “Mask Style Escape Set (PP10/PP15) please notify the training team in advance.
